Monday Ohio newspapers reported on "Restoring Prosperity: Transforming Ohio's Communities for the Next Economy" the result of nearly three years of work by the Brookings Institution, a nonprofit public-policy organization.

The report calls for a major shift of education money from administration, ninth-highest in the U.S. to the classroom (47th). (The report states the administrative ranking is based on "district administration" rather than school administration such as principal). It calls on state officials to create a "high-level education reorganization commission" like the one the federal government uses for military-base closings.

The commission would recommend school closings and consolidations aimed at eliminating districts with fewer than 2,000 to 2,500 students (interesting that the report tells the commission what to recommend). That would lower the number of districts statewide to 411 from about 611, the report said.

What will get lost in the reporting of this story will be that the projected administrative saving would be achieved by reducing the number of school districts. What we'll hear is that school administrators' salaries are too high.

I'd have to agree that Ohio has too many school districts; however, making the cut at 2,500 students will never happen. Here are some of the school districts with less than 2,500 students according to the Ohio Department of Education. I don't think anyone is going to make these districts consolidate:

The study also recommends better cooperation and collaboration between what it calls "tiny box" government entities - the state's 250 cities, 695 villages and 1,308 townships, but I doubt we hear much about that.
